CORN RECIPE CHALLENGE – April 24, 2015 **Buffalo Bill Cultural Center, Oakley, KS** **“Harvesting” the Spirit of Culinary Competition**

Kansans! Join the Corn Recipe Challenge. Enter your Kansas Hometown Team corn dish(es) in one (or more) of the following categories: **Main Dish, Side Dish, Dessert** or the Hometown **Kids Category** (for kids 12 and under). Teams may enter up to one dish in each category.

Rules

- Hometown Teams must consist of **two or more Kansans**. Each team member must contribute to the recipe or preparation in some way. Hometown kids – team up with mom, dad, grandparent, or friend.
- Bring your ready-to-taste dishes to the BBCC on Friday, April 24th between 9:00 am and 10:30 am. Dishes served cold or at room temperature may be brought in on Thursday, April 23rd between 3:00 pm and 5:00 pm.
- **Name your Hometown Team**. No real names, this is a blind taste test. Be creative! Your team name and town will be displayed with your dish.
- **Bring 100 recipe cards for display with your dish**. Please make sure to list all ingredients used and include your Hometown Team name and town on the recipe card. Teams will NOT be present during the challenge. Your dish will be presented and served (if necessary) by a Hometown Team Challenge Host.
- The BBCC will provide a table, small plates or cups, forks or spoons, and napkins, as necessary, for taste testing. Electricity is available for hot dishes in crock pots. You may also bring chafing pans and sterno.
- Corn recipes will be **judged by the public from 11:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m., Friday, April 24, 2015**. Contestants may not vote. Dishes will be judged on appearance, taste, creativity and the use of corn in the recipe.
- Winners will be announced at 5 p.m. Awards will be presented to the winning team in each category. Winning recipes will be sent to newspapers statewide.
